“The Conceptualization of Land and Temple in the Book of the Twelve: A Diachronic and Synchronic Approach.” Thesis. The Book of the Twelve has come under greater scholarly scrutiny over the last few years. There are three extant sequences for the Twelve: Hebrew MT, Greek LXX, Dead Sea Scroll 4Q76. Discernible communities and motivations can be seen ‘behind’ the traditions. This thesis examines the Hebrew edition and looks at the cohesive themes of ‘temple’ and ‘land’ in the corpus. This demonstrates how these pervasive concepts are used in the Twelve and identifies the community that these ideas would reflect. A reading strategy combining diachronic and synchronic elements is chosen to approach the biblical text. Supervisor: Prof Joachim Schaper
